2019-04-04 RVARC Meeting Minutes

Meeting was begun at 7pm by Vicepresident Scott Cummings, NA7OM. About 18 people were in attendance. President John Laybourne asked to resign some days prior to the meeting to attend to family health care needs. Treasurer Mike Bach had to leave for some medical tests. but later relayed the treasurers report: Bank balance of \$5025.08 + \$76.90 in petty cash. Scott mentioned that the RVARC has been active since 1936 and wanted to see more participation from the members to help keep the club active for years to come.

The permit for 7QP at Agate Lake was completed, and a thank-you was given to Jill at the County Parks & Rec Dept. for helpfulness. Scott stated that the premise for Field Day was emergency preparation trials, and looking back, it was recalled that Bud Larson, K7LNG, spent the 1955 Field Day in a

7:13pm, Presentation by Tom McDermott, N5EG, on HamSci 2019 held at Case Western Reserve University in Cleveland, OH. on March 22-23. Cleveland is also known for the Rock & Roll Hall of Fame, and the Cuyahoga River, which due to pollution, last caught fire in 1969, the 13th time since 1868! 7:54pm Presentation by Scott Cummings, NA7OM, on RFI and combating station interference. Some good tips on tracking down and eliminating RFI at your station were presented:

- 1. Get knowledge on RFI by Google search and at audiosystemsgroup.com/RFI-Ham.pdf, and www.audiosystemsgroup.com/ K9YC/K9YC-old.htm
- 2. Find domestic sources via the method of elimination using circuit breakers. Also check routers, appliances, LED power supplies, TV's, etc.
- 3. Find outside sources, using a directional antenna, such as neighbors, PP&L, etc. A disruption of licensed users is considered RFI, see FCC part 15.105. Intermittent or low


Secretary's Report

The Eugene Ham Radio Club also has good info at valleyradioclub.org/rfi.html
Scott recounted his efforts finding the sources of, and having neighbors and PP&L remedy, remarkably high levels of RFI at his station. These were due to plasma TV's, RV's, and power-pole wiring and distribution issues. Careful searching and persistence can result in significant reduction of noise levels at your station. It never hurts to have a spectrum analyzer available, either.

 - Tim was moderator of the Dayton Contest Forum for 10 years and has been moderator of the Hamvention Antenna forum for 34 years.
 - He is a founding member and current President of the North Coast Contesters.
 - K3LR serves as chairman of Contest University (13 years), the Dayton Contest Dinner (27 years), chairman of the Top Band Dinner as well as coordinator of the Contest Super Suite (34 years) in Dayton during the yearly Hamvention.
 - He is founder and moderator of the popular RFI Reflector (RFI@contesting.com) since 1999.
 - He has been a guest on Ham Nation many times.
 - Tim was a member of Team USA at the World Radio Team Championship five times, most recently in Germany during WRTC2018 with Sandy, DL1QQ.
 - Tim serves on the board of directors of the World Wide Radio Operators Foundation (WWROF) as Chairman and is President Emeritus of the Radio Club of America (RCA).
 - Tim is President of the Mercer County Amateur Radio Club (W3LIF).
 - Tim was elected to the CQ Contest Hall of Fame in 2006.
 - He was honored with the prestigious Barry Goldwater Amateur Radio service award by the RCA in 2010.
 - K3LR was honored as Hamvention Amateur of the Year in 2015 by the Dayton Amateur Radio Association.
 - Tim is the Chief Operating Officer and General Manager at DX Engineering.
 - He is a graduate of the Pennsylvania State University.
